President's Message - Dave Cook One Last Cast

Have you ever said "One Last Cast" and really meant it? Carol and I were fishing the Rocking Chair Hole at Lake Taneycomo at the end of August. It was near 8 pm, the sun had set, the fog was getting thick and darkness was setting in. I said it was time to go and I took my last cast. I hooked and landed and released the biggest rainbow trout of my life. That was my last cast that day. But in all honesty, if I hadn't caught that fish on that cast, then probably there would have been one more last cast.

For me, the first cast, the last cast and all the casts in between, I am expecting to catch a fish, a big fish. Whether I am fishing for bass, bluegill or trout, it doesn't matter. Don't we expect to catch a big one with that next cast? Are we disappointed when it doesn't happen? No. There is always the next cast. And the reason why has nothing to do with fishing skill. I believe it is well documented that fishermen are the greatest optimist in the world. That's how fishing makes me feel, that there is a great opportunity right in front of me. But it's more than that. My love of nature and the love of the sport has taught me that every day that we given to do the things that we love is a gift given to us. It has also helped me learn that all days are a gift and some days are just more special than others.

So after my last cast on that day, there was a prize that was in my hands that was allowed to swim free. I saw no other option. For the gift of the day was already mine.



Fly of the Month Partridge Soft Hackle By Dave Cook

This fly is very effective for browns and rainbows during the Fall. I tie this on a standard dry fly hook size 14 or 16.

Wrap the hook with orange, green or red rayon floss or colored thread. Tie in small copper wire at the back of the hook at the same time. Attach red 6/0 or 8/0 thread and tie off the floss at the head. Tie in two strands of peacock herl in the front half of the hook to build a peacock thorax. Tie off the peacock and trim. Wrap the copper wire to the head of the hook making sure you wind a couple of times thru the peacock as you move forward. Tie off and trim the wire. Select a soft hackle from the shoulder of a partridge skin or if you buy selected feathers use a small to medium sized feather. The hackle on a soft hackle fly should be sparse.

I take the feather I selected with the shiny side (the outer surface of the feather) facing me and I hold it at the top tip. Then strip off the left side of the hackle. Also, everything that is fluff on the right side of the stem should be stripped away.



That just leaves a few fibers in the tip top of the feather on the left side. (The fibers that remain on the right side of the stem is what makes the fly.)

Where those tip fibers meet the stem of the feather, tie in the feather near the eye of the hook right in front of the thorax. For right handed tiers, the tip is pointing to your right. Take the stem of the feather and wrap it about one and one-half times around the hook. Secure the hackle with your thread, trim the excess hackle, make a head and whip finish and cement.

This fly can also be tied with an all peacock body with red thread and the partridge hackle.
