JEFFERSON CITY Mo – The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will hold public open-house forums in March and April to help educate anglers and boaters about the dangers of “didymo” or “rock snot.”

This invasive alga forms large, thick mats on the bottom of lakes and streams, smothering aquatic life vital to the food chain that supports many fish species, including trout. Didymo (*Didymosphenia geminata*) has been found just south of the Missouri-Arkansas border in the White River.

According to MDC Fisheries Biologist **Mark VanPatten**, preventing the spread of this invasive species is critical to the health of Missouri’s lakes and streams. He added that recreational equipment such as boats, lifejackets, and fishing gear - particularly waders - are the most likely ways for Didymo to spread into Missouri.

To help reduce the spread of Didymo, remember, “Check. Clean. Dry.”

- Check all gear and equipment and remove any visible algae. Do not dispose of algae by putting it down a drain or into bodies of water.
- Clean all gear and equipment with a solution of 2-percent bleach, 5-percent saltwater, or dishwashing detergent. Allow all equipment to stay in contact with the solution for at least one minute. Soak all soft items, such as felt-soled waders and life jackets, in the solution for at least 20 minutes.
- Dry all gear and equipment for at least 48 hours by exposing it to sunlight.

VanPatten added that replacing felt-soled waders with waders that have rubber or synthetic soles can also minimize the risk of spreading rock snot and other invasive species.

Kids' Fishing Day



Night Trout Fishing Tips

While nighttime might not seem like a great time to head out to your favorite trout stream to catch a fish, it can actually be an effective way to get bites, just as long as you prepare for your venture before nightfall and use the best types of **trout fishing bait** for the environment. Night trout fishing, in fact, is a great time for trophy trout fishing.

If you are going to attempt nighttime fishing, you need to spend some time during the day scouting out a suitable location. If you do not, you will likely get tangled up in brush or else end up in a spot that you think is good but actually is not. Find a spot that will allow for easy casting and without obstructions that will be hard for you to see at night. After you have selected an appropriate location, collect your **trout fishing tackle**. Big lures work well for nighttime fishing, especially lures that imitate leeches or nymphs. If you are going to use some good sized bait, attach a floater to your rig, especially if you will be in a shallow area. Live bait, like chubs and worms, are also great choices for fishing in the dark. Having a flashlight with you will be helpful; one that can hook on to your fishing best will allow it to be conveniently located without being in your way.

As mentioned before, nighttime is a great time for catching trophies. Brown trout fishing is particularly good at night, because this is the time in which they feed. You might be able to land a cutthroat or rainbow as well, but browns are the main nighttime feeders. No matter the type of fish, understand that they are less inhibited at night than during the day and they are less spooked by noises and movement. Do not worry too much about your leader or lure splashing in the water because it will not scare away a fish like it might during the day. Color also does not matter as much at night, so select colors that will help you see it on the water rather than base your decision on presentation for your targets. Lighter colored baits will be most visible to the human eye.

Fly of the Month—John Deere

The John Deere has been ranked as the top fish catcher in the mini-jig category at Bennett Spring as reported in the [Online Fishing Report from Weaver's](#). Many times it has been reported as the best overall fly. This is a 1/80 or 1/100 oz mini-jig tied on a #10 or #12 hook depending on which size you prefer. This pattern also works well in larger sizes such as a 1/32 oz jig fished on ultra-light spinning tackle. Paint the leadhead with green enamel paint. The Testor's model paint works well with lead. Give the paint a day to dry and then paint the eyes with yellow enamel paint. A toothpick can be used to dot the eyes

onto the leadhead. Again give the paint a day to dry. Actual drying time is a couple of hours but you will have better success if you just leave them alone until the next day. Tie in olive marabou at the bend of the hook. You can have fibers extend all the way to the leadhead and wrap them with thread up to the head and then back down to the bend. You want a short, stubby, fluffy tail at the end. You could even tie in the marabou in backwards if you prefer a fluffier tail. Tie in small (size 00 or 0) green or olive chenille at the bend, advance your thread and then wrap chenille to the head, tie off and whip finish.

College Fishing Class
